If you're traveling the Massachusetts Turnpike driving west through Otis, for a few seconds you can see the blue manufacturing buildings, the cut granite face and the 600K wind turbine at Williams Stone Company. It took vision to realize that renewable energy from a wind turbine could power a quarry and dimensional stone manufacturing operation in Otis. This year we would like to dedicate our town report to Ed Williams.

When the Farmington River Regional School was being constructed Ed Williams and Williams Stone Company donated the granite for the retaining wall that runs along the sidewalk in the front of the building.

When the Otis Town Hall was being renovated and upgraded Ed Williams and Williams Stone Company donated the granite used for a wall cap, landing steps and curbing.

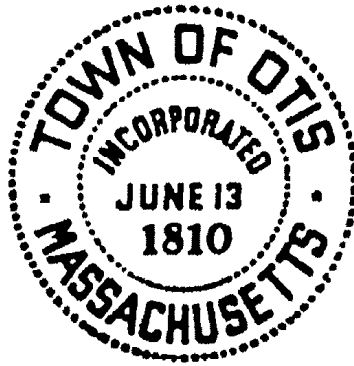
After the wind turbine at the quarry had been operational for about a year Mr. Williams came to town officials and suggested that the Town of Otis take advantage of renewable energy in the form of a wind turbine. Mr. Williams made several pieces of property available to the Town to use and then donated a parcel for the Town. Annual Report of the Otis Board of Selectmen

It has been our pleasure to serve the town during 2016. Here are some updates on projects the board has been working on.

Broadband: The Town has moved forward in partnership with Westfield Gas and Electric, a municipal light plant, to design and construct a town-owned fiber to the home network. WG & E has completed our pole survey and initiated the make ready assessment process with Eversource and Verizon.

The Town's plan is to build out the system in several stages, neighborhood by neighborhood. We anticipate that many, if not all, residents will have access to broadband service within a year.

The Massachusetts Broadband Institute and Massachusetts Technology Collaborative have approved the allocation of \$1,145,975.00 in grant funds for the project. The Town continues to advocate for its share of MBI's design/professional services funds.

Wind Project: Despite numerous delays, this project is almost at the finish line. The turbine will be installed and operational in 2017.

Town Buildings: With the assistance of the Energy Committee, Building Inspector and Maintenance Department, the Board has been gathering information about the long term maintenance costs of various town buildings in an effort to provide town services cost-effectively in appropriate facilities.

Finances: In FY16, Otis' average tax bill of \$2,573.00 was the one of the lowest in the Commonwealth, ranked 325th. Only 22 municipalities in Massachusetts have a lower tax rate than Otis' residential tax rate of \$8.08 in FY17. The Select Board and Finance Board remain committed to providing residents with high quality services without unduly burdening the taxpayers.

Thanks: The Board thanks all the volunteers who serve on our Town boards and departments for all their time and effort. The Town cannot function without the efforts of the close to 150 residents who pitch in every year.

The Board offers special thanks to Selectmen's Secretary Lisa D'Orazio and Town Hall Administrative Assistant Heather Venne for everything they do keep the Selectmen's

Fire Department

The Fire Department was busy this past year. We responded to 94 calls. We had one structure fire as well as motor vehicle accidents/fires, brush fires, chimney fires, alarm activations, downed wires, medical assistance, a boat fire and a drowning. We also assisted our neighboring towns for major incidents that they were dealing with. We took delivery of our new KME pumper truck in August. It is proving to be a great asset to the town.

Our membership remains strong with 26 active members. We continue to receive training from the Massachusetts Fire Academy. We are also training in house and with our mutual aid towns. Our annual Steak Roast in August and Pancake Breakfast in October continue to be successful thanks to your support. Through your generous donations we purchased and equipped a new John Deere Gator all terrain vehicle and added a new Holmatro cutting tool. We received a grant from the Department of Recreation and Conservation for Forestry Firefighting gear and equipment.

The Department would like to thank the Otis Select Board, Otis Rescue Squad, Otis Police Department, Otis Highway Department, Massachusetts State and Environmental Police, Mutual Aid Departments and the Residents of Otis for their assistance and support this past year.

Otis Rescue Squad 2016 Annual Town Report

We have had another busy year serving the people of Otis and neighboring towns through mutual aid. We have answered 177 calls as all ten EMTs have completed 45 hours of required continuing education classes. We also trained with the Otis Fire Department for auto and bus accident extraction.

In cooperation with the Fire Dept., we purchased a \$5,300 blood oxygen and carbon monoxide monitor which played an important role in saving a patient from suffering serious brain damage this summer.

It was my honor this year to award CPR Save pins to three of our EMTs and seven firefighters for the roles they played in saving a patient's life this summer. Her family is very grateful for the quick and skilled actions of all involved.

We are currently in the process of buying an automatic chest compression device (also known as a thumper) which all of us have seen in use and agree will be of great benefit to our patients. This device delivers better CPR chest compressions than a person can from the scene all the way through emergency room treatment. As this device's cost is over \$15,000 we will be seeking donations to offset the expense.

The members of the squad thank everyone who subscribes to Otis Rescue. The money raised really helps with our operational expenses and tells us our efforts are appreciated.

Lastly, as always, we are looking for a few good EMTs. Give us a call and see how you can be one of the people who answer your neighbor's call in time of need.

Southern Berkshire Regional Household Hazardous Waste

The Southern Berkshire (SB) Regional Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection Program begins its sixteenth year of operation on July 1, 2017. The goal of the program is to increase the opportunities for residents in South County to properly dispose of household hazardous waste while minimizing the cost to each participating municipality. The program continues to accomplish that goal. Fifteen towns have participated in the program this year and together, you help make it a success.

Nine collection opportunities took place in 2016; seven at the mini site collection sites in Lenox and Great Barrington, where residents could bring unwanted oil-based paint, stains, thinners and motor oil. Two comprehensive HHW collections were held in Lee and Great Barrington, where residents disposed of pesticides, cleaning products, mercury fever thermometers, automotive supplies, driveway sealants, solvents and many other common household products. About 394 households participated in at least one collection and more than 2,354 gallons and/or pounds of hazardous waste were collected and disposed of properly. In addition, about 1,367 gallons of paint and 313 gallons of motor oil were collected at the mini sites just this year.

The Collaborative worked in partnership with Goodwill again this year to collect electronics, CRT's, computers and peripherals at our two HHW events in the fall. We discontinued collecting propane tanks at our events because of increased costs to the vendor. However, all South County residents do have access to free propane tank recycling at Lenox Valley WTF in Lenoxdale. The collaborative updated and distributed our "How To" booklet for the safe handling and disposal of household hazardous materials. This is handed out at all of our events and made available for distribution at all transfer stations in our member communities. Most participating towns also list this valuable booklet on their websites.

It is time to begin thinking about FY 2018. The success of this program speaks for itself and the Steering Committee is making preparations to continue the program in FY 2018 at the same level of service and the same cost! We hope you are as pleased as we are with the program. Please let us know if you have any suggestions for program improvements.

FRRSD Paraprofessionals for 2016-17: The District employed 8.5 Paraprofessionals in Grades Pre-K through 6 to address the needs of special education, disabled, and regular education students in all settings. The District also employees several Paraprofessionals in “out of district” public placements to meet IEP requirements.

FRRSD Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy and Psychological Services for 2016-17: To address the therapeutic needs of students as defined through their Individualized Education Plans, 504 Accommodations agreements, or by other recommendations, the District engaged the services of therapists, as needed, on a consultant basis.

FRRSD Transportation Services for 2016-17:

The District has a multi-year bus contract with Dufour, Inc. to transport District students in Grades K-12 to the Farmington River Regional School, Berkshire Hills Regional School District and Lee Public Schools.

Additionally, to access students in outlying areas in both communities, the District employed its own drivers and District-owned vans to transport students in both towns.

School choice students are not transported.

FRRSD Tuition Agreements for Students in Grade 7 -12 for 2016-17:

In order to provide a free and appropriate public education for District students in Grades 7 – 12, the District maintains tuition agreements with Berkshire Hills Regional School District and the Lee Public Schools. These tuition agreements enable all parties to budget and plan ahead financially, based upon these agreements.

Parent and students can choose which of these two school districts they wish to attend after they leave Grade 6 at Farmington River Regional School.

FRRSD Parent Teacher Association – PTA – 2016-17:

The FRRSD PTA, with national membership and affiliations is a not for profit organization. This organization is very active in many aspects of the District. The PTA provided information on school events and issues to all District parents. The PTA held many creative fund-raising activities, such as the Cash Calendar and the Book Fair, to raise funds for school equipment and opportunities (classroom materials, technology purchases, field trips and in-school programs, ski memberships, etc.). PTA members also helped with Field Day, the Holiday Shoppe and other family events. They contributed thousands of dollars to the students' education, enrichment and recreation opportunities that could not be accommodated in the regular school budget.

FRRSD Volunteers and Collaborations for 2016-17:

The District students benefitted from many family and community volunteers who spent time in the classrooms and at the Otis Library working with children and doing projects with them. The Otis Cultural Council and the Sandisfield Cultural Council again donated thousands of dollars to the school for in-school enrichment programs and field trips. These volunteers served to enhance student learning and enrichment.





COLLABORATION WITH DISTRICT POLICE AND FIRE DEPARTMENTS

Otis and Sandisfield Police and Fire Chiefs, along with staff members from their respective departments, worked closely with the School Administration to develop a lockdown procedure and to work with State Police in the training of all staff members and parents in lockdown and shelter-in-place procedures. Our lockdown drills continued to be successful because of this partnership.

The Otis Police Department provided a Kops and Kids program in Otis during the April vacation to give local children the opportunity to interact with law enforcement officers in a proactive, positive manner while doing some very interesting and fun activities.

Use of District Facilities

The District continued to promote the use of our facilities to both Towns that comprise the District. Otis Recreation Department regularly provided a range of activities for the community, such as volleyball, dance classes and basketball. The Otis Cultural Council holds their Annual Craft Fair at the school in July. The District also continued to allow non-profit groups to use the school facilities after school hours, such as the scouts and the AMVETS.

Otis Police Department Annual Report 2016

The Otis Police Department responded to 898 calls for service in 2016. This was down slightly from 916 calls in 2015. The table below will indicate the types of calls that we responded to. It will also indicate whether this was an increase or decrease from 2014 and 2015.

Certain call types have increased. These categories include Alarms, Domestic Disturbances, Motor Vehicle Crashes and Mutual Aid calls. Other areas saw decreases. These included Breaking and Entering calls (down 50% from 14 to 7), larcenies and vandalism calls. With a total of 7 officers, we are able to provide a good amount of police coverage each week. Otis continues to be covered by the Mass State Police, Lee barracks, when Otis officers are not scheduled.

In addition to responding to calls for service, Officers completed a great deal of training. All officers completed firearms training, as well as In-Service Training, including Legal Update, Defensive Tactics, Fair & Impartial Policing, Witness Identification, First Responder & C.P.R.

The Police Department provided traffic coverage for events such as the Memorial Day parade and Halloween. We also assisted at the Otis Library Fair, Otis Community Day, and various other town events. The Department was honored by the Hilltown Rodders and also by the Dalton American Legion Riders for our assistance at their events as well. We also assisted the Sandisfield Police Department and the Lee Police Department with traffic control with their events.

The C.E.R.T. (Community Emergency Response Team) members helped out at Memorial Day events, the Library Fair, The Hilltown Rodders Car Show, and at the Halloween events. CERT team members include Michael Ernst, Marilee and Jim Higgins, Jim Wall, Knut Finnevolten, Robert Tutnauer, Dianna Hofer, and Michele Pettibone.

We also held our 6th annual Kops 'N Kids Camp during the April vacation. The Kops 'N Kids program emphasizes teamwork, community, and character education. We help students to make good choices and we develop relationships with them. The highlight of the camp was when students took a trip to the Charles Theatre in Boston for a performance of Blue Man Group. Students were fortunate enough to have a meet and greet with the actors at the end of the performance. Officers from the Becket Police Department once again assisted us with the camp program, and served as camp counselors. The Kops 'N Kids program was funded this year by the Town of Otis, the Otis and Sandisfield Cultural Councils, The Becket Police Association, Thomas Nadolny & Dana Mackenzie & the BRP Foundation. The Kops 'N Kids program also hosted the Otis Halloween events once again.

In August of 2016, Chief Sarnacki was invited to the White House to participate in a seminar to discuss the Obama administration's Task Force on 21st Century Policing report. One result of that seminar is that the Otis Police Department has chosen to participate in the Police Data Initiative, in which specific data regarding calls for service is collected and reported back to the White House.





There were no personnel changes within the department in 2016. Chief Roberta Sarnacki, Sgt. Daniel Hamill, Officer Bryan Arnold, Officer David Hamill, Officer Ken Pettibone, Officer John Mullen and Officer Charles (Chip) Whiting are the officers who serve our town. We look forward to continuing to do so in 2017!

The Otis Police Department would like to thank the Otis Board of Selectmen, the Otis Fire Department and Rescue Squad, the Otis Maintenance Department, the Otis Highway Department & the Otis Finance Board for their continued support of our operations. Thank you to Heather Venne and Lisa D’Orazio for their valued assistance as well. In addition, we would like to thank our surrounding town police departments, as well as the Mass State Police, for their mutual aid. Highway Department

In 2016 we were able to complete the Pine Rd. reclamation and repaving project. We also were able to reclaim and repave a mile long section of West Center Rd., Pearl Rd. and the library/recreation center parking lot. The removal and cleanup of the East Otis Meeting House was also a project the highway department completed this past year. The new pickup that was approved at town meeting has worked well for us so far and the small dump truck is nearly done being built. This year we took on a new employee Dan Collins who replaced Kyle Pettibone who moved on to another job to better his family.

Please remember to inform us of any roadway or roadside emergencies so we can deal with the issue in a timely manner. I also would like to take the time to ask residents to try and be patient with our snow and ice operations during the winter. These past few winters have had more ice and rain than snow which makes it extremely difficult for us to manage compared to snow removal operations. We do not forget any roads and maintain and treat them with materials as fast as our four man crew can get to them with our blacktop roads being priority. Many of you do not realize that when we have freezing rain on the roadways that we have to sand the roads in reverse to get any kind of traction with our trucks. Also, if a truck breaks down during one of these ice or snow events that will set us back considerably as we do not have any backup vehicles to take its place.

I would like to say thank you to my crew Tim, Joe and Dan for their hard work and sometimes long hours to keep our roads safe for you the residents. We would like to thank the Otis Building Maintenance, Otis Fire Department, Otis Police Department, and the Otis Rescue Squad for their assistance during the year.

Also we would like to thank the Otis Board of Selectmen, Finance Board, Town Hall Staff and the Towns people of Otis for your continued support.

Maintenance Department

The maintenance department is responsible for maintaining all town buildings, five cemeteries, the town beach, and operating the transfer station. We also assist in the operation of the waste water treatment plant.

The transfer station received some needed repairs this past year. The hopper was replaced on the garbage container, repairs made to the bottle and can containers, and new guides for the trash container and paper container. Our department cleared and leveled an area and made two eleven foot by twenty-four foot cement pads for the rigid plastic container and the tire container. Over 200 tons of recycling has taken place this year at the transfer station which turns into savings for the town on trash disposal. The new rigid plastic container separated more than four tons of plastic from going into the demolition tank.

The Erbe building windows were glazed and painted and the back porch was painted.

The East Otis fire house was stained.

Town Hall had three rooms painted, carpets cleaned, roof maintenance done, and windows washed.

We assisted with demolition of the meeting house in East Otis and replanted the lawn.

Cemetery mapping has been completed in the Soules Cemetery on Pike Rd, West Center Cemetery on Stebbins Rd, and Cold Spring Cemetery on Cold Spring Rd. They should be up on the town web site by the time you receive this report. We assisted with eight funerals in 2016 in the Otis Center Cemetery, and poured five foundations for stones.

I would like to thank the Maintenance department staff for their hard work though out the year, as well all other departments and boards for their support.

Annual Town Report **Energy Committee**

The Wind Energy Project is nearing completion with projected delivery of the turbine components in March and April of 2017. Contracts have been awarded to a single company R.F. Audet to perform all three phases of the construction necessary to install the turbine. The projects are the Civil Project which includes the subgrade preparation for the concrete foundation to be constructed; the Electrical Project which includes installation of almost a half mile of cable, poles and associated electrical equipment; and the Mechanical Project which is the actual installation of the turbine tower sections, nacelle or generator, and the hub and blades.

Although there have been challenges to the wind project, at this time Eversource, our local utility, SED or Sun Common our project consultants, Precision Decisions LLC our consulting engineer, the Town's Highway Department, Maintenance Department and the Energy Committee have worked through them and are on a track to install, commission and generate wind energy for the Town of Otis.

This project is revenue based, puts no burden on the tax rate, and has the potential to benefit residents directly and is worth working for.

The Energy Committee has been reviewing town buildings to determine each building's status and needs for a long term capital plan. Department heads and members are included in a committee to study the needs of individual departments and the needs of the town for the future of our community.

The Energy Committee meets on the third Thursday of the month at 5:00 PM at the Town Hall and all are welcome to attend.

Building Department Annual Town Report

One hundred and thirty-two building permits with a recorded value of \$6,972,221.00 were issued in 2016. The majority of these permits were for necessary alterations and renovations that include re-roofing, siding and replacing windows and doors. There were three new single-family dwellings constructed on previously undeveloped parcels of land and eleven new homes from an existing site that had demolition requirements. There were 12 photovoltaic solar (PV) installations on residential dwellings and accessory structures this year.

Amending the Town of Otis Zoning By-law setback requirements for non-conforming situations has allowed projects to move forward without the need for a Zoning Special Permit. If your project meets the new requirements several months of process time can be saved.

The Building Department page on the town's website, townofotisma.com is a place to look for information about building permits and applications, the Town's Zoning By-law, office hours, links to the State Building Code and other forms and documents. If you don't see what you're looking for or have a suggestion click on my name, Larry Gould, and send me an email or leave a message on the office answering machine at 413-269-0100 x 110. I welcome your comments.

The office of the building inspector can provide information and direction before any project begins, saving lost time and expense.

2016 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS

The Board of Assessors, along with our assessing staff provided under contract by Regional Resource Group, continues to assure the fair taxation of all Otis properties.

During the past year, we continued to reorganize and update assessment records. In addition, staff reviewed 86 building permits, which included new dwellings, additions, renovations and decks. 166 Real Estate transfers and approximately ten new parcel splits were recorded.

Assessing staff including RRG staff, attend classes and programs sponsored by the Berkshire County Board of Assessors and the Massachusetts Association of Assessors Officers.

Our Board strives to build and maintain good public relations. We provide residents with:

- Mailings to those eligible for special tax classifications and exemptions;
- Assistance in completing forms for residents eligible for exemptions and abatements
- Abutters lists required for certain criteria for various boards or permits
- Information on a host of tax and property assessment issues

Other office activities include:

- Processing parcel divisions and other map changes
- Processing real estate deeds

The Otis Library is a busy community resource. This year our 1268 patrons conducted over 15500 transactions. We welcome all this activity. We love sharing our 9721 items with everyone. With our membership in CWMARS (Central & Western Massachusetts Automated Resource System) we can share with all libraries throughout Massachusetts. We receive deliveries from this system twice weekly. It is a great sight to see how busy this library is! We are very proud to present and maintain this resource for all to use.

The library offers much more than just materials. Five computers are available for use with Broadband high-speed internet. High-speed WIFI access provides connections to the world for your use with your devices, IPADS< IPODS, Smart Phones, Tablets, and whatever is yet to come! This year we added a wireless printer, which allows printing from our computers, as well as from your WIFI devices. We replaced the Xerox copier, with one that can handle higher volume. Every day technology expands our world. Our gifted and knowledgeable technician conducts monthly help sessions for computers and technology. A wide screen audio video system that can access information from the internet, individual presentations and material on DVD's has been installed in the Roosevelt Room. This equipment widens our capabilities to access and present material. Members of the community and organizations can use this equipment for acceptable uses.

This year we conducted several special programs. Steve Otfinski presented his new works on the Titanic, Pearl Harbor, and the assassination of John Kennedy with juniors and young adults. Steve has become an integral part of our community and he will return for other presentations. Several artists exhibited their work and shared their works at public receptions. The children's summer reading program Ready Set Read was fun. Once again, we were fortunate to have the hospitality of Karin and Susan Oygard as they hosted the end celebration with a llama and alpaca yoga fest, and ice cream party. Our LEGO club meets monthly to test the imagination and creativity of our young patrons. During the holidays, we hosted different activities through our Reindeer games and Lego holiday party. The Farmington River Regional School students under the direction of Laura Catullo exhibited their artwork during the months of November and December. Young children musicians under the direction of Kelsey Grey entertained us during the reception. The annual Read Across America choice was *The Bear Ate your Sandwich* by Julia Sarcone - Roach. Preschool and kindergarten students shared their experiences and they shared special sweet sandwiches made by Hillary Howard. We collected donations and purchased over 50- books in memory of Cora Barrett, a delightful, spirited young girl from Sandisfield who died of complications from a heart transplant. She taught us of life, energy, and love. The purchased books were given to the Sandisfield Library, the Farmington River Regional School Library, and our library. We collected 50 pairs of pajamas to give to the Cradles to Crayons project sponsored by the Boston Bruins and Massachusetts Libraries. Donated pairs of pajamas





collected are distributed to needy children to help them feel safe and warm. This year we hope to collect 60 pairs of pajamas. Growth and progress require money, effort, time and hard work. The Otis Library and Museum has been fortunate. Zoning Board of Appeals

Annual Town Report

The Zoning Board of Appeals consists of five members and two associate members. The board members are appointed by the selectmen for a term of five years and the associate members are appointed for a term of one year as provided in Section 12, Chapter 40A of the Massachusetts General Laws (MGL). All members serve without compensation.

The Board hears requests for Appeals, Variances, and Special Permits under the Town of Otis Zoning Bylaws and M.G.L. Ch. 40A. The Board of Appeals acts in a quasi-judicial capacity on the issuance of certain special permit applications and petitions for variances from the Zoning Bylaws. The Board will hear and decide appeals by any person aggrieved by reason of their inability to obtain a permit, enforcement by an administrative officer or Town Board, or the failure of the Zoning Enforcement Officer to enforce the zoning law or request of a town resident or land owner. Decisions of the Board of Appeals may be appealed by an aggrieved party to the District, Superior or Land Courts.

Information and duties are outlined in the Town of Otis Bylaws Section 9.2.

During the past calendar year the Board of Appeals convened six meetings and adjudicated four cases. In each of the cases presented, the board voted in favor of the application.

The Board generally meets on the first Monday of each month, as needed. All hearings are open to the public.

Conservation Commission

The primary role of the Otis Conservation Commission is to preserve and protect the integrity of the town's wetland systems, while striving to work with and serve our community. With nine designated great ponds, as well as the West Branch of the Farmington River, the Otis Conservation commission is one of the most active conservation commissions in the state. In 2016 this commission conducted 78 site visits, heard 13 Notice of Intents applications (NOIs), 42 Request for Determinations of Applicability applications (RDAs), issued 7 enforcement orders, 10 emergency certifications, 4 certificates of compliance and 3 forest cutting plans.

In an effort to better serve the community, the Commission has brochures on understanding the Wetlands Protection Act (WPA) and Conservation requirements, available to the public free of charge. These brochures provide the basic information of what is required to come before the commission and how (RDA vs NOI for example). The commission now meets at 6:00 PM, on the third Tuesday of each month, so as not to conflict with frequent Monday holidays. The deadline for submission of applications is on the first Wednesday of each month, by 6:00 PM, no exceptions. Our regular monthly office hours are now the first Wednesday of each month, from 6-9 PM.

The Conservation Commission would like to thank Bob Mason, with the MASS Department of Conservation & Recreation. Bob regularly attends commission site visits and meetings, offering invaluable assistance within his responsibility with DCR on wetland and/or waterway issues. The commission would also like to thank the Otis Board of Selectman for their continued support, as well as the community for working with the Conservation Commission, and following the applicable guidelines.

At 7:00 pm the Moderator delayed the meeting for a few minutes due to the long line of voters waiting to check in.

Meeting called to order at 7:03 pm at the Otis Town Hall by the Moderator.

The Moderator led us into the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Moderator called for a moment of silence to remember those whom we have lost in the past year.

The Moderator appointed Marjorie Middleton, Emily Piacquadio, and Jill Moretz as counters if needed.

The Moderator asked that all cell phones be on silent.

The Moderator asked everyone to use the microphone so everyone could hear one another.

The Moderator confirmed with the Town Clerk a quorum was present.

A motion was made to dispense with the reading of the remainder of the warrant and proceed to act on Article 1.

The motion was seconded.

The motion passed.

ARTICLE 1: To receive the reports of the various Town Officers and act thereon.

A motion was made to accept Article 1.

The motion was seconded.

No discussion.

Article 1 passed





ARTICLE 2: To raise and appropriate such money as may be necessary to defray the Town's expenses for this fiscal year. See appropriations list attached at end of Warrant. (\$5,287,128.79)

A motion was made to accept Article 2.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion regarding the salaries of the Building Inspector, Town Administrator, and the Town Hall Staff based on the amount of posted hours and Town Hall being closed on Friday.

The Moderator requested a count.

Article 2 passed

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$111,572.00 for the purpose of paying the principal and interest due in fiscal 2017 for the second of five annual payments for the 2016 KME fire truck purchased in FY16 and to take said sum from free cash.

A motion was made to accept Article 3.

The motion was seconded.

No discussion.

Article 3 passed.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to pay for the demolition of the old meeting house in East Otis and to take said sum from free cash.

A motion was made to accept Article 4.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion about appropriating money and using state resources to save the meeting house.

Discussion to save the school house which is located on the same parcel so it does not end up like the meeting house.

Discussion about the historical significance of the meeting house verses the school house.

Article 4 passed.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the replacement of the gym floor in the Otis Town Hall and to take said sum from free cash.

A motion was made to accept Article 5.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion: When was the current floor installed? Jim Crandall, Maintenance Supervisor said the current floor was installed approximately 15 years ago.

What will keep it from buckling in the future? The floor will go out to bid and it will have a warranty.

Discussion about different types of flooring to be installed.

What is the purpose of the new floor and what is wrong with the current floor? Chris explained the gym is regularly used for exercise classes such as yoga, pilates, and basketball.

Article 5 passed.





ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to expend \$86,077.00 for the purpose of paying the principal and interest due in fiscal 2017 for the second of three years of payments for the Western Star Truck purchased in FY15 and to take said sum from free cash.

A motion was made to accept Article 6.

The motion was seconded.

No discussion.

Article 6 passed.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to accept \$179,437.00 as an Available Fund under the Chapter 90 State Aid to Highways Program.

A motion was made to accept Article 7.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion: What roads will be repaired? Derek Poirier, Highway Superintendent stated the roads that require the most repair.

Article 7 passed.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$63,200.00 for the operation and maintenance of the municipal sewer system and to meet the appropriation, transfer funds from the sewer user fees.

A motion was made to accept Article 8.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion: Is the WWTP Operator salary in article 2 part of this \$63,200? Chris Morris explained the WWTP Operator salary of \$55,000 is part of the Article 2 and not part of this Article. The figure of \$63,200 has not gone up in the past several years because the plant is being handled so well.

Article 8 passed.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to maintain separate Revolving Funds pursuant to MGL, Chapter 44, Section 53E ½ for the following fees. Fees received by Town Officials shall be credited to the respective revolving fund and expended for payment only by the authorization of the Town Treasurer. Respective expenditures from said Revolving Funds shall not exceed the amounts shown below for Fiscal Year 2017 without prior approval from the Board of Selectmen:

Plumbing & Gas Inspector	\$15,000.00
Wire Inspector	\$15,000.00
Fire Department Inspections	\$6,000.00
Sanitation Inspector	\$9,000.00
Recreation Commission	\$5,000.00
Demolition Debris Removal	\$25,000.00

A motion was made to accept Article 9.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion: What is Demolition Debris Removal? Chris Morris explained this is when you bring demolition debris to the transfer station and pay a fee. The fees paid are credited into this revolving fund to later pay for hauling costs to get rid of the debris.

Article 9 passed.





ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to purchase turnout gear washing equipment for the Fire Department and to take said sum from free cash.

A motion was made to accept Article 10.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion. Sandy Pinkham, Fire Chief explained originally the Fire Department was asking for \$10,000 but since discussion with the Select Board and Finance Board other sources of funding were found. These sources are \$5,000 from free cash, \$3000 encumbered from the FY15 budget and \$2,500 from the fire department fundraising account.

Sandy explained why the washer and dryer is expensive. This washer and dryer is specialized to take out all ash and fine particles that are permeated into the fire fighters gear. This washer reduces cancer causing agents that end up on the turnout gear from fighting the fires. Unlike your home washer and dryer this all has to be done in a specific washing and drying cycle and at exact temperatures.

Discussion about funding sources and if the Fire Department still needed \$10,000 from free cash. Article 10 passed.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for the replacement of the 2009 GMC Dump Truck and to take said sum from free cash.

A motion was made to accept Article 11.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion: How much free cash is left? Chris Morris explained if everything is approved this evening there would remain \$417,409.23 in free cash.

Where would the revenue from the trade-in or sale of this truck go? Chris Morris said it would go back into free cash.

Article 11 passed.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the replacement of the 2009 Sierra Pickup Truck and to take said sum from free cash.

A motion was made to accept Article 12.

The motion was seconded.

No discussion.

Article 12 passed.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$461.16 to pay five FY15 invoices; \$87.19 due the Berkshire Eagle for advertising; \$36.67 due Viktoria Seavey for services rendered; \$218.65 due Peter Kolodiej for mileage; \$40.00 due RW's Inc.; \$78.65 due Verizon and to take said sum from free cash.

A motion was made to accept Article 13.

The motion was seconded.

No discussion.

Article 13 passed, one opposed.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$44,000.00 from the FY16 Principal Assessors Salary line to the FY16 Assessors Expenses line.

A motion was made to accept Article 14.





The motion was seconded.

Discussion: Could you explain why the Assessor's salary had money last year and not this year? Chris Morris explained after the annual town meeting last year the Principal Assessor resigned and the Board of Assessors has hired RRG Group to provide assessor services to the town. As an outside vendor they should not be paid out of the Town Payroll but rather the Assessor's expenses.

Article 14 passed.

Blake Middleton, Moderator recused himself for the remainder of the evening.

The Town Clerk explained Town Meeting needed to elect a temporary moderator and asked if there were any nomination from the floor.

A motion was made to nominate George Mengel.

The motion was seconded.

George Mengel accepted the nomination and was elected.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to ask the Board of Selectmen to consider appointment of the current Police Chief, Roberta Sarnacki, to a three (3) year term or take any other action thereon.

(Petitioned article; the entire text reads "This petition for a warrant article is proposed by the undersigned, and respectfully requests that the Town of Otis ask the Board of Selectmen, to consider appointment of the current Police Chief, Roberta Sarnacki, to a three (3) year term. Roberta's continued performance, and dedication to this position has warranted such a measure, and such an appointment would help to remove personality and politics from the equation. We, the undersigned Thank You for your consideration of this request.")

A motion was made to accept Article 15.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion: Town Counsel explained he issued an opinion that both of the petitioned articles are not binding on the town because, the Board of Selectmen is the executive appointing authority who hires, fires, does appointments, chooses the terms, and negotiates the contracts. The second issue with these articles is personal privilege. This isn't the forum to deal with individual questions who should be appointed and who shouldn't. Town Counsel wanted everyone to be aware not to violate personal privilege rules.

A motion was made to have a secret ballot for both Article 15 and Article 16.

The motion was seconded.

The secret ballot passed for Article 15 and Article 16.

Discussion about the Chief having a one year appointment verses a three year appointment and the timing of the potential change.

A motion was made to pass over Article 15.

The motion was seconded.

The Moderator explained the motion on floor is about passing over the article and discussion needs to be on passing over the article.





Discussion: If the article was passed over would the term stay as is? Town Counsel reminded everyone the article is non-binding.

The motion was withdrawn to pass over Article 15.
The second was withdrawn to pass over Article 15.

A motion was made end debate and to call the question.
The motion was seconded.

Discussion: Town Counsel explained this requires a 2/3rds vote. A yes vote ends debate and a no vote keeps discussion going.

The motion to call the question passed unanimously.

The Town Clerk explained the secret ballot process.
The registrars handed out the ballots and voting began.
Registrars Emily Piacquadio and Jill Moretz counted the ballots.

Article 15 failed.

FY 2016 Board of Health Agent Report

In fiscal year 2016, there has been a steady increase of Title 5 inspection reports being conducted in the town of Otis. Around half of the submitted reports required a full septic system upgrade due to a variety of reasons, many of which being older system over 20 years. A large percent of the upgrades that have been submitted, due to the nature of the size of the lots, setback challenges, needed local board variances to comply.

Recreational Camps for Children such as Bonnie Brae, Soccer Camp at Larkum Pond, Camp of Latter day Saints at Bonnie Brae and Otis Ski Ridge camp met full compliance with relevant codes. All camps remain in good standing and meets compliance with regulations. Other inspections included complaints on housing and other chapter II Sanitary code inspections. One housing inspection yielded a condemnation order in Fiscal year 2016. However, the order had been lifted in early FY2017 and remains in full compliance with the State Sanitary Code.

The 2016 beach testing season the past summer yielded a high level of compliance. Many thanks to the Board, Town Hall staff, and employees for their valued assistance and dedication. We look forward to a healthy and safe 2017.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD TOWN OF OTIS

The Planning Board is responsible for preparing and maintaining a comprehensive master plan (MGL Chapter 41, Section 81D), Propose, review, hold hearings and make recommendations on zoning bylaw/ordinance changes to the Town Protective By-Laws, Review and act on subdivisions – preliminary & definitive plans (MGL c.41, section 81K-81GG), Review and sign Approval Not Required (ANR) plans and is required to review, hold public hearings and make recommendations on proposals that will affect land use.

The Planning Board oversees Site Plan Reviews and hears requests from property owners or developers seeking to divide a tract of land, reaffirm boundary lines or create a new subdivision...who, must submit surveyed plot plans to the Board for appropriate action as governed by MGL, Chapter 41, Section 81.

The Town of Otis requires any new lots to be a minimum of one (1) acre, have 150 feet of road frontage and provide adequate access for emergency and vehicular traffic in the R-1 residential district. In the Village V-1 district lot area shall not be less than 20,000 square feet and the frontage shall not be less than 60 feet.

The Planning Board acted on a number of Form-A plans to divide properties and/or secure newly surveyed boundary lines under the guidelines & requirements of the Subdivision Control Law.

The Otis Master Plan and Open Space & Recreation Plan were updated and duly approved by the Board and the State. Again, the Planning Board wishes to thank all the members of the Master Plan Steering Committee, the Selectmen and the Berkshire Regional Planning Commission for all their fine work in preparing these document updates.

The Planning Board continues to work with the Otis Historical Committee, the Otis Historical Society, Otis Conservation Committee, Otis Recreation, Berkshire Regional Planning Commission and other State Agencies on projects such as Otis Sewer district, Community Development, Community Preservation, Community Center, Watershed projects, Historical Preservation and seeking and applying for Grant opportunities.

The Planning Board meets on the second Monday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in the Town Hall. The Board welcomes property owners with questions concerning the required procedures to sub-divide their land under the laws.

Technology Committee

2016 Annual Report

2016 was an exciting year for the Technology Committee. Our main focus has been on bringing high speed internet to the town of Otis. Significant progress has been made and we are actively moving forward. We have contracted with Westfield Gas & Electric (Whip City Fiber) to conduct our pole survey and to do the design for our network. This survey has been finalized and we are in the process of submitting our pole applications to Verizon and Eversource. Once the make ready has been complete we will begin to string fiber. In addition, MBI has sent us an award letter for \$1,080,000.00 to be put towards the construction of this project.

After many years of service to our town, our primary computer maintenance person, Bob Roche, has decided to retire. We wish him well in his retirement endeavors and hope he knows he will be missed. To replace his services, the Technology Committee has contracted with Network Engineering & Security for equipment maintenance for the town computer systems. The Town of Otis was awarded a grant of \$15,000.00 to upgrade our computer security and systems and both Bill Hiller, NES and the Maintenance Department are working together to rewire the Town Hall with a new robust system. When this project is completed, the Town's computer network will have significantly increased speed, and security to meet state code for today and the foreseeable future. When attached to the upcoming broadband network we will be able to offer additional services that will be in demand in the future. We have also added new wifi hotspots to the Town Hall so the entire Town Hall is covered as is much of the parking lot. Residents who currently do not have internet at home are encouraged to use the meeting rooms when available and the parking lot during non-business hours.

We also have addressed multiple other issues including policy rewrites and updates and the normal equipment issues and updates that come up. We are also looking to upgrade the Town of Otis Website and make changes to our e-mail to bring us into state code.

We are looking forward to a very exciting and busy 2017 as the projects all move forward and we continue to bring Otis into the digital age.

All members of the Otis Technology Committee continue to look forward to working with and for you to bring modern technology to our rural town and are thankful for your support.

Otis Cultural Council

For 2016, the members of the Otis Cultural Council approved funding of 26 grant applications. These included 2 workshops for adults, 7 youth programs, 5 school field trips, 1 music performance and 11 donations to local groups. Our funds come from two main sources: Massachusetts Cultural Council (a state agency) and the Town of Otis, as voted at our Town Meeting every year. In addition, our members raise money through fundraisers, deposit bottle and can recycling, and donations from folks who want to help support our activities.

There are 3 funding categories: programs for the young people of Otis, community-wide events, and donations to cultural programs in Otis and neighboring towns.

Youth Programs: Providing cultural opportunities for our young people is a top priority. Programs funded through FRRES included field trips for all grades, in-school activities such as a sculpture, drama club, musical events, a Flying Cloud science program studying the Farmington River, and Berkshire Theater Group's writing program. We also underwrote The Great Encampment, a weekend of Colonial re-enactments organized by Mr. Chris Keller, 5th grade teacher at FRRES. He arranged for Ye Olde Town Lebanon Militia to set up a week-end long, authentic re-enactment of colonial life on the school grounds. This wonderful event was open to all students and the public. In addition, the OCC also supported programs offered by the PTA, Kops 'n Kids, Lee High Drama Club, and the 4H club.

Community-wide. Our collaboration with the Otis Community Day committee brought Wanda Houston and her Band to the Sup & Swing, our annual picnic and community concert under the stars. There were workshops for painters, quilters, and the 9th Annual Arts Festival which offered a venue for local artists and craftspeople to show off their talents.

Donations: As always, there were many worthwhile organizations applying for funding. We try to choose those that fulfill our mission and benefit Otis residents.

In addition to all of the above, some of our members (and their good-hearted spouses!) work sorting deposit bottles and cans at the recycling site at the Otis Transfer Station. We collaborate with the AmVets on this project, which brings the deposit monies back to benefit the town. Thanks to residents who separate and contribute their deposit bottles and cans to the blue barrels at the transfer station.

We continue to support the Beautify Otis project by organizing volunteers to set up and maintain flower barrels throughout the town. Thanks to all the local volunteer gardeners who plant and maintain the barrels all summer and also to Jamie Carr at Otis Ridge Garden Shop for her generous support.

BERKSHIRE COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL OPERATIONS IN THE TOWN OF OTIS 2016

Larval surveillance and control began on 5/5/16 for known breeding sites in the town. The first larvae were detected on 5/5/16 and by the end of the season 34 sites had been treated with larvicide. Spray operations to control adult mosquitoes began on 6/17/16 with 6 spray applications being completed in the town by the end of the season. All 234 catch basins in the town were treated with larvicide in June with 90 day BTI product providing season long control. Surveillance for West Nile Virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis began on 6/27/16 with 20 mosquito pools submitted. This represents 1000 mosquitoes tested with no isolations for WNV or EEE in 2016. Spray operations and surveillance concluded on 9/2/16.

Community Health Programs: Report on FY17 Activities To-Date for the Town of Otis

December 21, 2016

We are pleased to report on the following Community Health Programs (CHP) services that were provided to Otis residents during the past year to promote the health and well-being of the residents of Otis.

CHP's Women, Infants, Children (WIC) provided essential nutrition education and WIC checks for healthy foods to town pregnant or postpartum women, newborns, toddlers, and children under the age of five who met the federal governments' eligibility requirements. CHP hosted farmer's markets, provided free and emergency food, hosted monthly healthy food distribution events, gave nutrition classes, and breastfeeding counseling and support.

CHP Family Services served residents of Otis through playgroups held on-site at Family Services offices in Great Barrington, and at playgroups in neighboring rural towns in South County – including a weekly playgroup in the Otis Town Hall, through a generous in-kind donation of space from the Town. CHP also offered a clothing exchange, lending library, consignment sale, fuel and holiday relief funds, and distribution of donated food and childcare necessities.

CHP also provided primary and preventive care to Otis residents of all ages who were patients at one or more of CHP's medical or dental facilities, including CHP on Wheels. Residents had access to primary and preventive care, dental services, and comprehensive women's health care – regardless of their ability to pay, their immigration status, or insurance coverage.

Through patient and client records, playgroup attendance sheets, event attendance records, and WIC participant data, we know that many Otis residents were served by CHP this past year. CHP provided medical care to 223 town residents in the last year. CHP WIC provided nutrition services to 15 families – when compared to US census data for the town, this means that half of the Otis households with children under 6 benefited from CHP WIC/Family Services support. Young children and families attended playgroups in Otis and in surrounding towns, and accessed resources at our Great Barrington site such as the playroom, clothing and book exchange, food donations and distributions, and other support services. Members of the town who were served by CHP included veterans, WIC participants, public housing residents, families living below the poverty level, citizens of multiple races and ethnicities, and ranged from age 0 to 84. CHP served students, teachers, nurses, artists, electricians, accountants, maintenance workers, retired workers, and many other talented town residents.

We are grateful for the support that the town of Otis has provided that has helped make such a difference in so many lives of its residents, regardless of their economic status.
